What are the aims of this policy?

• To ensure that teachers, parents and children have a clear understanding regarding expectations for home learning.

Why is home learning important?

- Research has shown that children make most progress when they consolidate their learning at home.
- It helps to inform you about your children's school work and allows and gives you the opportunity to support this work.
- It is a valuable life skill and develops good work habits for secondary school and future employment.

Roles and Responsibilities

School:

- To provide support for parents with information about home learning.
- To be available to talk to parents and children about home learning.
- To ensure all home learning is sent home via Parent Mail and put on the class website pages.

Parent/Carers:

- To support the child in completing home learning
- To contact the class teacher whenever a problem arises.

Child:

- To ensure they have everything they need to complete home learning each week.
- To put in the same level of effort as would be expected of class work.

How much time should my child spend on their home learning each day?

You know your child best and how long they can reasonably spend completing home learning tasks. However, some home learning such as the 'Termly Topic Take Home Tasks' may require more time due to the fun and engaging nature of them.

It is recommended, that where possible, time should be given over daily to some tasks such as reading. This can be built into part of your daily routine, for example, sharing a book as part of a bedtime routine.

What home learning will my child be given?

To support children's reading across the school, every class takes part in the 'Blast off into Reading' challenge. In 'Blast off into Reading', each child is expected to read for a minimum of 3 times a week and this should be

recorded in their reading record. If children are successful in doing this, they move around the board and once they have reached a certain point they receive a raffle ticket and are entered into a weekly draw to win a book.

Year group home learning opportunities are provided as follows:

Reception

- Reading books from class 'banded' books are sent home books are changed by the children during the week
- Key words for reading and or spelling
- Key sounds of the week put in children's reading records
- Topic chats provide opportunities for activities at home to enhance learning

Year 1 and 2

- Reading books from class are sent home books are changed by the children during the week
- Common exception words for the year group that they need to learn to read and spell are sent home at the beginning of the year (see Appendix 1)
- These words are assessed by February half term and an amended list of words the children need to learn are sent home in Spring 2
- Termly topic take home tasks

Year 2 – once all common exception words are learnt the Y2 spellings from the National Curriculum are then sent home

Years 3 - 6

- Reading books from class are chosen by children to take home books are changed regularly.
- Common exception words and spelling lists from the National Curriculum at the appropriate level for each child are sent home at the beginning of the year. Children need to learn to read and spell these words.
- These words are assessed by February half term and an amended list of words to learn are sent home in Spring 2
- Termly topic take home tasks

Further opportunities for home learning

Every term, each year group holds a topic chat for parents. This is a good way to find out more about the expectations for spellings and key words to

be learnt. At these meetings a selection of ideas for curriculum take home tasks are given out, which are more creative ways of learning that the whole family can join in with.

Throughout the school, children are working on their Maths Mission targets. This starts with counting and moves on to learning the times tables and division facts. Practising these facts at home would benefit your child's learning.

As part of Philosophy 4 Children, a new question or stimulus will be sent home every month via the newsletter. This is designed to encourage your child to develop their reasoning, explanation and questioning skills.

Why will children sometimes be given extra home learning?

Sometimes children may receive extra support in school to help them with their learning. This can result in being given extra tasks to complete at home, for example, additional reading and sentence work as part of the ECaR intervention or extra maths or English work as part of 1:1 tuition. If this is the case, the teacher leading the interventions will contact you and talk through the expectations for completing these tasks. You will be invited in to see a session and be shown ways in which you can further support your child's learning at home.

In the Spring term, Y2 and Y6 children will be asked to complete some SATs practise papers at home.
