


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#LetGirlsPlay

Rudyard Reading Recommendations


Hello all, every week the English Team and various adults around school are sharing two reading recommendations for you and your lovely children to read.

I'm a Feel-O-Saur By Lezlie Evans Illustrated by Kate Chappell





I'm a Feel-o-saur helps young readers explore all the different feelings that everyone has! This book cleverly explains, models and provides tips for dealing with these emotions through different dinosaurs.


