If you have been a member of the Reading Support Network before and would like to re-join, again please contact the office. We'd love to have you back on board!




Rudyard Reading Recommendations



Using carefully chosen words and phrases, such as 'belonging' and 'be loyal', it creates a special moment for grown-ups and children to focus on what it means to be a friend and nurture friendships. Children can discover and understand new words to help them to talk about the ups and downs of first experiences and new emotions with confidence.

KS2 - Indie-Rae in Seacole for being helpful sorting out all the books.




Breakfast Club
