
Empowerment Approach

Our staff team have been working with Kit Messenger, a previous Headteacher and now director of Changing Chances to develop the Empowerment Approach at RKPS.

The Empowerment Approach programme teaches young people:

- About their brain and how it works.
- About their needs and how to manage well even when these needs aren't being met and become stressors.
- How to prepare to be at their best for learning and socialising.
- How to problem-solve when things go wrong so they feel good AND those around them do too.

Over these next few weeks, children will develop their awareness and understanding of their 5C needs:



And how to best meet these needs in ways which are good for everyone.



This ties in really well with our Just Right Approach, which is already embedded.





Year 3 have been learning how communities help form our cultural identity and that everyone's cultural identity is different. We thought about all the things in our lives that are important to us and make us who we are. We then created our own collage to show what is important to us and what gives us our own identity.

With our PSHE topic being citizenship, the children of Mandela class have been learning about what it means to be a refugee and how we, as both individuals, and a collective, can help to ensure everyone feels welcome and safe in our city. The children have been so empathetic in their response to learning about the hardships refugees endure. But what was so heart-warming, was hearing what the children of Mandela class said about what they, and Brighton and Hove as a city, could do to help: offering a smile; learning to say hello in a new language; finding out the interests of their new friends; offering shelter and donations; offering schools places and so much more. It sounds to me like the children of Rudyard really understand how to be welcoming citizens!

Next week we will be celebrating Walk to School!



Rudyard Reading Recommendations


Hello all, every week the English Team and various adults around school share two reading recommendations for you and your lovely children to read.

Gloomy Baboony: It's Okay to Feel Sad By Lizzie Simpson




This is a fabulous illustrated poem. A brilliant book to teach empathy and explore feelings with young children, but equally as powerful for adults too.

Gloomy Baboony is feeling sad and bad and he just doesn't know why. He doesn't want to eat or play and he feels like something is missing. Eventually he realises what he needs is someone to listen and show him they care.

This is a really gorgeous story which is written in such a simple way but has a really powerful impact. It teaches a great lesson that we can all feel sad at times but when others are there for us to listen and show they care, we can feel happy again.

Pony by R.J. Palacio



From the hugely successful author of **Wonder**. Pony stands on its own. Entirely different from Auggie, Silas Bird is every bit as extraordinary. Struck by lightning as a boy, he lives with his bootmaker-photographer father and imaginary friend Mittenwool, a ghost.

Mittenwool wakes Silas as riders arrive to take his father away; Silas takes the return of one riderless pony as a sign for him to follow his father, setting in motion an extraordinary journey across the wilds of the early C19th MidWest. Different setting, different characters, different themes, but the same compelling storytelling and deeply satisfying reader experience: a novel you want to finish to find out what happens, but don't want to finish because it means leaving that storyworld and the friends you've made in the book. In the author's note she says "I spent many years researching this book, and I hope none of it shows"; it doesn't. If you like a book with gasps — and I do — you'll be happy.
