
Ariah


Hello all, every week the English Team and various adults around school share two reading recommendations for you and your lovely children to read.

Wonderfully Wired Brains written by Louise Gooding and illustrated by Ruth Burrows




Combining neurodiverse experiences with science, history, and brainbursting facts, Wonderfully Wired Brains has something for everyone!

Whether your child is neurodiverse or not, this book will inspire inquisitive young readers and show them that no two brains function in the same way, and that everyone's differences should be celebrated.

Accurate, understandable explanations of diagnoses that impact the brain, including each area of neurodiversity and what it can or does mean for anyone with that particular neurological difference. We love this book for developing understanding of yourself and others.

The Circle Breakers by Patience Agbabi



This third book in Patience Agbabi's The Leap Cycle trilogy is an action-packed, inspirational joy. Whirling with invention, an indomitable spirit and quick-witted thinking is 14-year-old autistic protagonist, Elle.

Elle and her friends are going to a not-to-be-missed funfair. But a ride on the Ghost Train takes them further than they ever imagined. They end up in 1880, face-to-face with criminal mastermind, The Grandfather!

To Elle's surprise, he needs her help. Someone has threatened to reveal The Gift to the media. If that happens, everyone will know that Leaplings can leap through time; no Leapling will be safe. Meanwhile, Millennia's power at the head of The Vicious Circle grows.

Will Elle work for a villain to save her secret community? Can she and The Infinites crush The Vicious Circle for good?








How many triangles can you count?
