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


Summer (Miss Stokes)


"Students who read for pleasure make significantly more progress in vocabulary, spelling and maths than children who read very little." Sullivan and Brown 2013.

Once Upon an Alphabet. Short Stories for all the Letters by Oliver Jeffers



A brilliant, humorously executed, concept based around the idea that each letter must have a story because 'If words make up stories, and letters make up words, then stories are made of letters'. A very brief, frequently philosophical, story is attributed to each letter. The meaning is melded together by Oliver Jeffers' expressive cartoon style drawings and by the inclusion in the text of several words beginning with that letter. Thus battling Bernard and Bob burn a bridge, and Mary discovers that molecules matter. An implied moral can be teased out from some of these short fables. Unexpected links occur between several stories. Find out what elephants and envelopes have got to do with the letter N. Meet recurring characters the owl and the octopus who roam the world solving problems.

The Valley of Lost Secrets by Lesley Parr




An enthralling wartime adventure, Parr's debut children's novel centres on a lonely evacuee and a spooky discovery in a Welsh village.

September 1939.

When Jimmy is evacuated to a small village in Wales, it couldn't be more different from London. Green, quiet and full of strangers, he instantly feels out of place. But then he finds a skull hidden in a tree, and suddenly the valley is more frightening than the war.

Who can Jimmy trust? His brother is too little; his best friend has changed. Finding an ally in someone he never expects, they set out together to uncover the secrets that lie with the skull. What they discover will change Jimmy - and the village - forever. A mesmerising mystery about bravery and brotherhood from an outstanding new voice.



Arbor Parent Portal launch date!

Our launch date for Arbor Parent Portal is Tuesday 20th February.

During half-term all parents and carers will receive log in and a help guide ready for our launch date. A welcome email will be sent on Monday 19th February which will enable you to setup you Arbor account. Your first login will need to be in a browser not the App. Once you have logged in via a browser you will then be able to login via the App.

We will also include regular updates in the newsletter. It is really important that you download the Arbor Parent Portal and enable notifications on your phone to make sure you can keep up to date. The school office will be available to support parents and carers during the transition period.

From Tuesday 20th February, you will now use the Arbor Parent Portal to:

- Book After School and Breakfast Club (in advance and on the day bookings)
- Sign your child up for paid and FREE clubs
- Book school trips
- Order uniform
- Book paid Nursery sessions
- Secure parents evening slots
- Update your contact details and parental consents

All payments for the above items will be made through the portal at the time of booking. However, school meals and outstanding items in ParentPay such as the residential, will remain on ParentPay. All new trips will go on to Arbor.

Arbor also has communication function, however at this stage, we will be remaining with School Ping for day to day communications. Please keep you eyes peeled for updates in the newsletter.


