This week in Year 4, we have been learning about the naming ceremonies of Sikh children called the 'Naam Karan'. Relatives and friends gather for this special occasion. During the ceremony, the reader of the Guru Granth Sahib opens the holy book at a random page and reads the hymn on that page. The first letter of the first word of the hymn will be the first letter of the child's name. All Sikh names can be used for boys or girls. If the baby is a boy, the word 'Singh' (which means lion) will be added after the first name. If the baby is a girl, the word 'Kaur' (which means princess). Dempsey worked hard to complete the missing words and draw some beautiful pictures to show what happened at the ceremony.

## Naam Karan - The Sikh Naming Ceremony

Sikh babies are not given a name until they have a special ceremony called $\qquad$ . When the $\qquad$ and baby are able to travel they go to the $\qquad$ with their friends and family. The baby is placed in a cot decorated with flowers and
$\qquad$ . Everyone sings songs and says $\qquad$ to wish the baby a happy and healthy $\qquad$ . The person leading the
