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Headteacher Reports...

For the two years since the disruptions caused by Covid, our end of KS2 outcomes have been among the strongest of all Brighton and Hove primary schools.

In reading, nearly half of our children leave our school working at the higher standard, or 'greater depth' as it is known in educational circles. Our greater depth reading result is 42%, 13% higher than the National number, impressive by all accounts. This is not by chance. It is the result of the creation of a long-established culture of reading at RKPS where our children learn to love books as soon as they arrive with us.

Yesterday was a fine example of this as we celebrated National Poetry Day across the school. I had the pleasure of being invited to watch our 2 and 3 year old Nursery poets perform a wonderful Neil Armstrong poem where they zoomed to the moon before moonwalking in space! Year 4 Mandela read out their excellent 'Refuge' poems and the day ended by some of our oldest Year 6 poets sharing their poems with poets in Year I and Year 2. The whole school was awash with poetry!

We are proud to have created such a dynamic reading culture here at RKPS: teachers are forever thinking of fresh and new ways of helping our children fall in love with literature. Yesterday afternoon, I watched Leon's mum read Reception Thunberg class 'The Turnip' picture book in Polish-the children absolutely loved it!

Thank you to all our parents and carers who find the time to come in and listen to children read: you are a key part of this reading culture. If you think you could add to our small army of reading volunteers, please let your child's teacher know or contact the school office.

I am delighted that we will be welcoming the return of the book fair next Tuesday to coincide with our first Parent Consultation event. Courtesy of our friends at the Book Nook, there will be some fantastic new titles available to buy. There will be a great variety of other books to buy too, all at prices for everyone to leave home with a new book to enjoy!

Our teachers are busy preparing for next week's Parent and Carer Consultations where they will be able to tell you what your child is already doing well and-just as importantly-what they can do to become even better still.

Thank you to those parents who are being mindful of not parking on the zig-zag lines at the front of the school. Your consideration creates a safer environment for everyone, including our children.

# Smile Out Loud: 25 Happy Poems by Joseph Coelho and illustrated by Daniel Gray-Barnett



Joseph Coelho has written the brilliant poems in this book to help children spread happiness. Excellent!

Some of the poems are designed to be read in a group, some are perfect for reading aloud or performed, and some are interactive, requiring a child to read the poem in a mirror and pull a variety of silly faces, do a dance or close their eyes and imagine.

Some of the language included in the poems – cadaverous, Jeté, Windsor knot – might need explaining by an adult, but they are examples of good 'challenge' words that Coelho's poems contain to stretch confident readers in a fun way. A lovely, interactive and fun book with super fun illustration by Daniel Gray-Barnett that really conveys the sense of joyful activity the book contains.

#### Miss Vaughan recommends A Kid in my Class by Rachel Rooney and illustrated by Chris Riddell



This brilliant little book is one of Miss Vaughan's (and now her classes') favourite poetry book. It is full of clever poems - picking out some of the many personalities that children will find sitting next to them in assemblies, lunch queues and in the playgrounds.

Rachel Rooney's poems are easy to read with bouncy rhymes and clever forms. They make poetry accessible, relatable and, most importantly, fun. From the first one there in the morning, to the classroom hamster, with all the copycats, jokers, tough kids, drama queens and prefects in-between, children will love spotting the kids in their class and maybe get a glimpse of themselves, too.

As well as witty words, this book is crammed with imaginative illustration from former Children's Laureate Chris Riddell. A master of expressive faces and marvellous monsters, Riddell puts a beautiful pencil portrait with each picture, as well as a stunning inked illustration that reveals more. The pictures will start as many conversations as the poems.
