Yesterday, we welcomed 26 teachers from 12 other schools to RKPS for another 'Power of Reading' training session. We are proud to be a Power of Reading Associate School, helping raise standards in reading and writing for all children across the city.

This year, 96% of our Year 6 children reached the expected standard in reading, the highest of any school in Brighton and Hove. Our culture of reading is well embedded at Rudyard and has been established over very many years. Our children are taught to interact with a wide variety of exciting, diverse texts through a range of teaching techniques including, of course, drama: one of the most powerful teaching tools of them all.

Our Power of Reading training always includes a visiting author: yesterday illustrator and author, Ken Wilson-Max spoke to colleagues which was a real treat. We are incredibly fortunate to have Miss Vaughan as our Head of English to coordinate these events and share her expertise with others.

Once again, we are in the top ten performing primary schools in the whole of Brighton and Hove. You can compare our school's academic performance with that of other schools at https://www.gov.uk/school-performance-tables

The high academic standards our school is known for is attracting many new families to RKPS. Soon, we have a number of open events for prospective parents and carers whose children will start Reception in September 2025. 
Tiger




Hello all, every week the English Team and various adults around school share two reading recommendations for you and your lovely children to read.

Reading Research Alert:

"Students with more positive attitudes towards reading are more likely to read at or above the expected level for their age." Clark 2014.

I hear you by Kallie George and Illustrated by Carmen Mok



This is a beautiful book that transports us into the serene and majestic world of the mountains. Through the eyes of a child, the story explores the quiet conversations we can have with nature when they take a moment to truly listen.

A little girl with her family venture through a lush mountain landscape, listening carefully to the whispers of the natural world around them. From the rustle of the trees to the calls of birds, the story beautifully captures the magic of mindfulness, connecting with nature, and appreciating the small yet meaningful sounds that often go unnoticed.

We love that this book and in fact the whole series, is a great way to introduce mindfulness to children. It also created space for conversations about the wonders of the natural world, encouraging outdoor activities and adventures. The gentle onomatopoeic sounds throughout create a sense of calm and are also a great way to explore language together.

The illustrations are so beautiful and bold. Each page is filled with rich, vibrant depictions of forests, mountains, and wildlife created with soft, warm tones.

We felt really immersed in the mountains and the wildlife.

The message of slowing down to appreciate the world around us is an important one for all ages and makes this a perfect addition to every bookshelf!

Trixie Pickle Art Avenger: Toxic Takedown by Olaf Falafel



Trixie Pickle is an arty 'sort-of-superhero' and this is her second adventure (the first being Trixie Pickle, Art Avenger). Trixie and her best friend, Beeks, have a lot going on in their lives. First, there is the latest edition of their comic, Blammo, to work on. Then there are the 'mean girls' to avoid or they will cause all sorts of trouble for Trixie and Beeks. There is also a new mystery illness doing the rounds; nicknamed 'Wormwood fever', it makes the patient very ill and can be briefly summed up by the words 'it's coming out both ends'. Could the mystery illness have anything to do with someone Trixie sees dumping toxic waste in the local reservoir? Who is it and can they be stopped? Trixie has a comic to finish, a mystery to solve and enemies to get revenge on . . . but all in an artistic way of course and with plenty of scope for mishap.

Full of fantastic, detailed fact files of the real artists who inspire Trixie and fully illustrated by the author, it was great to discover some artists I hadn't been aware of before. This is a fast-paced, funny, fact-filled book which will appeal to art lovers, adventure lovers and humour lovers. It would also lend itself extremely well to a variety of art projects based on the artists featured.


