Online Safety

Online safety - inappropriate adult content

As children are accessing social media more and more, we have noticed an increase in the number of children repeating or acting out memes they've seen online. Some of these memes are harmless, but a number have inappropriate adult themes and shouldn't be repeated in school.

On Tuesday, Year 6 had an assembly with two police officers from Sussex Police's Youth Team, and one of the topics discussed was the use of social media. The children were reminded that the *minimimum age is 13+* for accessing apps such as WhatsApp, Snapchat, Instagram and TikTok, where many of these memes are viewed. The officers explained that, if primary school-aged children are using these apps, it is *their parents' responsibility* to monitor what they are watching.




Kater Cielo by Rachel Katstaller

Withdean Athletics

On Wednesday, a group of children from Years 4, 5 and 6 faced the blistering conditions and travelled to a very famous location, Withdean Stadium, the former home of Brighton and Hove Albion FC, and the current home of Brighton's prestigious running group, Phoenix. The RKPS athletes competed in a variety of events: Vortex Howler, standing long jump, sprint, sprint relay and the fiercely competitive 600m race (more on that shortly.)

We all know that winning is a great feeling but that should never come before the children's enjoyment and attitude. With that in mind, we couldn't be prouder to say that the children's incredible spirit, behaviour and sporting attitude was exemplary from start to finish. All the adults who attended commented that, despite an incredibly hot and competitive day, not a single child let their emotions get the better of them and they displayed the ethos of our school. It was both impressive and joyful to behold.

There were so many highlights on the day, far too many to mention, but there were two that stood out. Firstly, Woody's care and consideration for teammates who were disappointed - always offering them support and encouragement with an arm round the shoulder and endless kind words. He really does embody what it means to be a true sportsperson. Secondly, Alex's performance in the 600m event. With nerves jangling, she stepped up to the start line as the crowd watched on in anticipation. 'On your marks, get set, GO', and Alex refused to be swept up in the early sprinting which took its toll on so many others towards the end of the race. Instead, she remained assured and composed, cruising from 4th into 3rd, before breezing into 2nd place with 300m left. As the excitement reached fever pitch, and her teammates willed her on from the stands, she raced into the lead with 200m remaining. With the finish line in sight, she sprinted to take gold and earn a well-deserved victory! Keely Hodgkinson, watch out!

We ended up winning an impressive, 1 gold, 4 silver and 4 bronze.
