We are extremely fortunate to have our local secondary school within walking distance of RKPS.

Earlier this week, our Year 5 children strolled down to Longhill High School where they were treated to a magical performance of Beauty and the Beast. All the adults accompanying our pupils remarked upon how polished a performance it was. The acting, singing and dancing was all of the highest quality and our children were buzzing when they returned to school.

Some of our pupils' comments included: "That was the best show I've ever seen!"; "I loved the hand movements of the candle!" and "Can we go and watch it again?" It was lovely for our children to see a number of Rudyard alumni performing also, to inspire them for when they go to secondary school.

Muslims fast before sunrise to sunset


But wait, that's not all just yet?

But hopefully will stay in a good mood?






Hello all, every week the English Team and various adults around school share two reading recommendations for you and your lovely children to read.


Explore the daily lives of children around the world through the lens of a single, special day in June, the longest day of the year in the northern hemisphere and the shortest in the southern hemisphere.

The rising and setting of the Sun is one of the few truly common experiences in our diverse world. This book places that shared experience at the heart of its global story.

Every year, during the June solstice, the Earth tilts towards the Sun, creating either the longest or shortest day of the year. Across the world, people celebrate this day in different ways, from bonfires and banquets to firework festivals and ancient rituals. In this book, you will celebrate the solstice alongside 14 fictional characters from 14 real places around the world. You will be transported to Antarctica, Argentina, Australia, South Africa, Ecuador, Indonesia, Nigeria, Nepal, Morocco, China, Turkey, America, the United Kingdom and Norway. Each account is both a personal story and an informative narrative, full of cultural insight, geographical information and words from each native language. Meanwhile, specially commissioned artwork, by illustrators from each place, bring familiarity and warmth to every page.
