Headteacher Reports:

We are extremely fortunate to have such a multi-skilled and committed group of school governors working behind the scenes here at RKPS.

Superbly led by co-chairs Craig and Alex, our governing body are very much at the heart of strategic decision making and are intrinsic to our school's continued successes. We are currently looking to recruit two new parent governors-you will have received a letter earlier today-so if you'd like to get involved, and help further strengthen our school, we'd welcome your application.

The role of a parent governor is very varied: for example, one of our governors helps at my after school cricket club, the interactions with our children are often some of the most rewarding parts! The minimum time commitment is one meeting (two hours) once a half term which will hopefully fit in with parents and carers' busy lives. The closing date for applications is next Friday, June 13th.

This week, the wind and the rain did not deter our children enjoying a cricketing feast. On Wednesday, we sent two teams to compete in the Sussex schools cricket tourney. We played several matches, winning more than we lost. As John Simpson (Sussex CCC captain) told our players when he held a bespoke training session here last term: 'You don't lose, you learn'. I could not have been prouder of our players.

Yesterday, all our KS2 children enjoyed some marvellous Sussex CCC coaching here in school, taking part in cricket related activities which will hopefully encourage them to fall in love with our national summer sport. Next Wednesday, it is the turn of the girls to compete in a girls only cricket tourney at Preston Park and I look forward to watching them compete.

The rain is forecast to disappear next week, just in time for the class photos next Wednesday. The day before this, our Year 5 children are being treated to a visit to watch a production of 'Beauty and the Beast' at Longhill, our local secondary school.

We are delighted that the Woodingdean Carnival will soon be returning to Rudyard. On Saturday July 5th, we are looking forward to hosting this wonderful community event once again and hope that the sun will shine.



Luna Loves Gardening Joseph Coelho & Fiona Lumbers




Previous Children's Laureate Joseph Coelho returns with his well-loved character Luna. This time, Luna is exploring the magic of gardening.

Luna is impressed by the community allotment when she visits with her family. Luna takes time to wonder about each seed she encounters — where in the world it came from and what it will turn into. With the help of Grandpa and Nana from Jamaica, Luna realises that every new seed planted will have its own story to tell.

This is a really beautiful picture book celebrating nature, gardens, community, the interconnectedness of humanity and the importance of stories. Fiona Lumbers' artwork is stunning, drawing out the elements that most capture a young child's imagination with an abundance of colour, while also contrasting the vibrancy of the community garden with the grey, surrounding cityscape.

She Speaks: The Women of Greek Myths in Their Own Words by Honor Cargill-Martin & Camelia Pham



In She Speaks, passionate classicist Honor Cargill-Martin redresses this imbalance by retelling eight classic Greek myths, this time from an all-female perspective.

Written in first-person, we hear from the astute sorceress Medea and her pivotal role in the quest for the Golden Fleece; discover the contributions of Cretan princess Ariadne in the slaying of the Minotaur; witness the strength and resilience of Atalanta, Circe, Helen of Troy, and many other women who have been previously overshadowed by their male counterparts.

With her meticulous research and insightful storytelling, readers will be mesmerised as Honour resurrects these voices, breathes new life into well-loved stories, and drags the Classics into the modern world.
