
Hello all, every week the English Team and various adults around school share two reading recommendations for you and your lovely children to read.

How to Get Your Teacher Ready by Jean Reagan and illustrated by Lee Wildish




Everyone focuses on getting kids ready for school, but what about teachers? How do they get ready for the year ahead?

Filled with energy, humour and warmth, this is the perfect book for little ones getting ready to go back to school!

Molly is in her final year of primary school, with secret dreams of becoming an Olympic swimmer. Having always lived in the shadow of her manipulative friend, Chloe, Molly finally has the chance to compete in a regional swimming contest and define herself on her own terms. But with the pressure of fitting in, and the sudden arrival of her mysterious mum, will she give up on her dreams for a shot at popularity? A hugely exciting debut with a classic underdog story, a wonderfully relatable protagonist, and an important message of friendship, body positivity, and celebrating who you are.

I recommend this to Years 5/6, it is really important to have books like this that validates feelings about body image that are such a normal experience for many young people. I also really liked that Molly's enjoyment of swimming demonstrates how positive taking part in sport can be. What comes through strongly is the way in which swimming provides a healthy physical outlet as Molly processes her emotions and how being part of a team improves her self-esteem.




