Headteacher Reports:

Yesterday, we proudly hosted the first inter-school sports tournament of this academic year, on this occasion: tag rugby.

Our school has a long history of sport and it was fitting that yesterday's sport was rugby as this is a long standing tradition of the school. Some parents will likely remember Mr Lacey, Rudyard PE teacher in the 1990s. Rugby was one of his passions and I am delighted that we continue to teach our children this super team sport to this day.

It was a special occasion last weekend which saw the England women's rugby team win the world cup: hats off to the 'Red Roses'! It represents a fantastic opportunity to encourage more girls to play rugby.

As a school, we are passionate about encouraging our children to enjoy a healthy lifestyle in terms of exercise and diet. All research shows that what a child eats and their ability to concentrate and learn is directly linked.

As a healthy school, we ask that children do not eat crisps or chocolate at breaktime. Such 'junk food' will likely have a negative impact on the child's learning in class. A piece of fruit or cereal bar is a much better alternative to provide a child with the energy they need to be at their 'brain best'.

It is fine for a child to have one 'sweet treat', either crisps or chocolate, in their lunch box to accompany their healthy food but this should be the exception to a healthy lunchbox or school lunch. I will be speaking to the children about healthy eating in this coming Monday's assembly.

Thank you to all the parents and carers who ensure that their children are enjoying a nutritious lunch each day: it really does help with their learning.

Tomorrow is our first Open Event for prospective Reception 2026 parents. We have lots of families booked onto the tour and look forward to showing them around our school in the morning.





Forest School Volunteering!

We would love for you to join our growing team of volunteers at Forest School!

We are looking for dedicated volunteers to support our weekly sessions. If you are able to offer more time than just for your own child's class, you will have the opportunity to receive additional, specialised training with our Forest School leader to help you in your role. This is a fantastic opportunity to become a core part of our learning community and help shape the children's experience.

The Role of the Volunteer

We are seeking enthusiastic and reliable volunteers to join our team and support the delivery of high-quality Forest School sessions. This role is perfect for anyone who has a passion for the outdoors, enjoys working with children, and wants to contribute to a unique and rewarding educational experience.

Key Responsibilities:

Supporting the children: Assist the Forest School leader in ensuring the safety and well-being of all participants. You'll help children engage with activities and encourage them to explore and learn at their own pace.

Facilitating activities: Help to set up and supervise various activities, such as den building, using tools (under direct supervision), and fire safety, while following our strict health and safety procedures.

Encouraging positive behaviour: Model respectful behaviour towards the woodland, other participants, and yourself, fostering a supportive and non-judgmental community.

Site management: Help with the daily checks and preparation of the site, ensuring it is safe and ready for the session. This includes tasks like checking for hazards and helping with tidying up.

Documentation: Assist the Forest School leader with taking observational notes and photographs to help track the children's progress.

This role is ideal for you if you are:

Passionate about the outdoors and the benefits of nature-based learning.

Patient, enthusiastic, and reliable. Happy to work in all weather conditions, from sun to rain. Able to support and encourage children's self-esteem and confidence. A team player who can work collaboratively with the Forest School leader and other adults.

We believe that our volunteers are a vital part of our community of learning. This role offers a fantastic opportunity to develop your own skills, gain experience in outdoor education, and make a real difference to our children's expierence.
